

# St. Matthews Lutheran Church

#### HISTORICAL NOTES

The story of our church is a story of phenomenal growth. The number of souls enrolled in the Parish Record under date of March 4th, 1904, was not small. There were 579. To-day, thirty years later, that number has increased six-fold, and has reached the 3,000 mark. Every tenth church member in Kitchene<sup>J</sup> belongs to St. Matthews Church.

St. Matthews Evangelical Lutheran Church was founded on Feb. 23, 1904. A few days later, on the first Sunday in March, the infant congregation worshipped for the first time in the County Court House. In the same month the old Methodist Meeting House on North Queen St. was bought for a church. Dr. E. Hoffmann was called to be the first pastor. During his pastorate of more than eight years the congregation grew and prospered.

In January 1913 Dr. C. R. Tappert became his successor. The old building on Queen Street no longer was able to accommodate the large congregations which assembled there. On May 24th, 1914, the cornerstone of the new edifice was laid, and on March 7th, 1915, St. Matthews Church, as it now stands was dedicated. Dr. Tappert served our congregation slightly more than two years. Rev. C. Zarnke slightly less than two years. Then Rev. M. Arendt supplied the pulpit for four months until, on May 1st, 1918, the present pastor assumed office.

In 1920-21 the debt of \$25,000, which rested on the church, was paid off. In 1924 the bell, weighing 6,000 lbs., was installed in the church tower. In 1925 the interior of the church was decorated, a Gothic reredos installed in the sanctuary, and chimes, the gift of Mr. F. Daub, added to the organ. These improvements involved an expense of more than \$6,000.

Meanwhile the congregation has continued to expand. During the last few years the need of a Church House for Sunday School purposes has impressed itself upon our members. In 1931 the lot adjoining our property on Church Street was purchased. In the near future serious consideration must be given to providing for the needs of our one thousand children. The congregation itself, which is compelled, at present, to share the church auditorium with the Sunday School, must likewise be considered.

May the Father in Heaven, Who has prospered us in the past, continue graciously to guide and help His people in the years to come.

## Anniversary Echoes

from

#### ST. MATTHEWS LUTHERAN CHURCH

#### Feb. 11th and 12th, 1934

As a matter of record a brief description is here given of the festival services which were held in connection with the 30th anniversary of our church and the 4th birthday of Kirche Daheim.

In view of the circumstance that the 23rd of February, the date of the founding of our church and also of the first radio broadcast, happened to fall in the first week in Lent, the Church Council provided for the celebration of these anniversaries at a somewhat earlier date, and selected for that purpose Sunday and Monday, February 11th and 12th.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOLS CELEBRATE EARLY

The festivities began very appropriately at 9.30 o'clock on Sunday morning with a joint celebration of the entire Sunday School in the church auditorium. As the organ played "Onward Christian Soldiers" the doors were flung open and the Beginners and Primary Departments, together with the German Sunday School, coming up from the basement, marched into the church to take their places with the other departments already assembled there, until the whole church was filled with well nigh 800 teachers and scholars.

The assembled host sang, "Around the Throne of God in heaven thousands of children stand," and then, in response to the pastor's questions, the smaller children, in spontaneous reply and appropriate songs and prayers, bore witness to the joyous occasion and to the many good things which God has given us to be thankful for. Mr. J. E. Vogt, veteran Sunday School teacher, had been chosen to present a brief historical review, while Mr. J. H. Eydt, the first, and also the present, superintendent of the English Sunday School, surprised the pastor with flowers and the nice things that one can say with flowers. The German Sunday School contributed the hymn, "Gott ist die Liebe," and all joined heartily in the stirring words of, "My Church, my Church, my dear old Church, my father's and my own," and "Faith of our Fathers."

Our children are entering happily into the heritage of faith that is being handed down to them. They are our pride and our joy. In their sparkling eyes there shines prophetically the still brighter future which God is even now preparing for St. Matthews Church.

#### FOUNDERS PRAISE GOD

At 11 o'clock the German congregation assembled to give thanks to the Lord. Among them were many who had been active in the founding of the congregation. In contrast to the youth, who had just marched out a quarter of an hour earlier, singing, "Onward Christian Soldiers," there were now gathered in their places many grey haired men and women, who were numbered among the charter members thirty years ago, at a time when none of the scholars which now make up the Sunday School were yet born.

The choir sang, "Herr, Deine Guete reicht so weit der Himmel ist," and the people followed with the opening hymn, "Bis hieher hat mich Gott gebracht." Bortnianski's "Komm heil'ger Geist" was sung by the choir after the Epistle, 1 Cor. 13, 1-13, while an anthem of praise was rendered after the sermon.

The sermon was preached by the Rev. Prof. Geo. Sandrock of the Waterloo Seminary, a member of our church, on Psalm 132, 9, "Let thy priests be clothed with righteousness; and let thy saints shout for joy." In a psalm, dealing with David's care for the Ark of God, the preacher found in this particular verse a description of the festal garments, which the priesthood of believers should put on to celebrate properly the anniversary of their church: the garments of joy, of penitence, and of zeal to labor for the church's defense and extension.

The sanctuary was tastefully decorated and presented a picture of festive beauty. Thirty American Beauty roses from the charter members of the Ladies' Aid adorned the altar. On either side, in the midst of ferns and palms, nestled two bouquets of Calla lillies, placed there in memory of Mr. and Mrs. John Karn. The basket of Spring flowers, presented to the pastor by the Sunday School, provided a setting for the bronze memorial tablet to Dr. E. Hoffman, the sainted founder of the congregation.

#### BIRTHDAY BELLS OF KIRCHE DAHEIM

Der Sonntag kommt mit leisem Schritt Bringt jedem Christen etwas mit Im heil'gen Gotteshause; Doch mancher der da schwach und krank, Und mancher Einsame seufszt bang: Kann nicht aus meiner Klause.

Doch horch! Ist das nicht Glockenklang? Ist das nicht Orgelspiel und Sang, Das durch die Luefte rauschet?— Es dringt ins Krankenkaemmerlein Wie lichter, warmer Sonnenschein, Und mancher Kranke lauschet.

Wo kommt der Segen Gottes her? Und fuellt das Herze, das so leer, Am lieben Sonntag Morgen?— Aus Sankt Matthaeus kommt der Klang! Und dafuer sei Dir herzlich Dank, Du Stiller mancher Sorgen!

Although only the choir remained in church for the special observance of the 4th birthday of Kirche Daheim, the thousands of listeners, who were taking part in their homes everywhere, made this celebration the largest and the most widespread of any. It opened immediately after the German service with a fifteen minute organ recital by the newly appointed organist, Mr. W. H. Bishop, F.R.C.O., and then continued until 2 o'clock with a carefully arranged program, in which the members of the Radio Committee gave interesting accounts of the various aspects of our church broadcasts, which again were interspersed with hymns and anthemns by the mixed choir, and the reading by Mrs. Schmieder of "Gebet einer Kranken," a poetic anniversary offering by the Rev. H. R. Mosig of New Hamburg.

It was nearly two o'clock when the choir signed off with, "Now thank we all our God." Beginning with the German service at 11 o'clock, we had been on the air continuously for three hours.

#### THE ENGLISH JUBILEE SERVICE

At 7 o'clock in the evening the large festival congregation united in singing, "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty," "I love Thy Zion, Lord," and Justus Falckner's "Rise, ye Children of Salvation," with its significant lines, "Saints and heroes, long before us, firmly on this ground have stood."

The Rev. Prof. F. Clausen, D.D., President of the Waterloo College and Seminary, preached the sermon on the church's foundation, guarantee of permanence, and challenge for service, as suggested in the text from Acts 2, 22-24 and 32. The choir contributed two suitable numbers, Alexander Matthews' "The Lord is my Light" and another fitting anthemn of praise.

The new numbers and name cards for the hymn boards, a gift of the charter members of the Ladies' Aid, were used for the first time during the services on this Sunday. Without the day was cold, like the cold February days of thirty years ago, when the congregation was founded, but within all hearts were warm with thanksgiving to God.

#### WORKERS UNITE

On Monday night, Feb. 12th, the organizations of the church, who have contributed so much to the life and vigor of the congregation in the past, met to celebrate and to pledge anew their loyalty to the Lord whom they serve. Apart from the Church Council — which was represented by all the members at present in office, together with those who had served in previous years, among whom was Mr. H. A. Hagen of the charter council — there were six organizations who answered the roll call.

The congregation was honored by the presence of the Rev. J. H. Reble of Hamilton, the President of the Canada Synod. President Reble alluded to the position of leadership, which St. Matthews congregation had won for itself within the Synod of Canada and to the consistent support, which our church has given to the missionary, educational, and benevolent work of God's Kingdom on earth, and charged the people to be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord.

In the church the Ladies' Aid occupied the largest block of pews. Before being addressed by Pastor Mosig in German, they presented to the treasurer of the church a cheque to cover the balance still due on the lot at the rear of the church, which was purchased in December, 1931. The Rev. C. S. Roberts brought greetings to the Women's Missionary Society. Dr. H. A. Sperling, pastor of the mother church, spoke to the Brotherhood. The Rev. A. Buehlow of Galt, a teacher of our Sunday School for eight years, had been selected to offer congratulations to his former associates, and the Rev. S. Wittig of Conestogo greeted the Luther League and recalled his connection with the local society during his student days at Waterloo. Dr. J. Maurer of the First English Church extended felicitations to the choir upon their completion of thirty years of service to the church.

It was a delightful experience to sit among this diversified but closely aligned gathering of workers, massed in the two middle rows of pews, and to realize that all were organized to promote in some definite way the welfare of the church as a whole. It was also a pleasure to sit face to face with the President of Synod and the pastors of our neighboring congregations and to feel that the old mother church and her sisters have a tender regard for St. Matthews. And finally it was an enjoyable opportunity for fellowship which the ladies provided, when they arranged for an informal intermingling of guests, members, and friends after the service.

#### INFORMAL RECEPTION CONCLUDES FESTIVITIES

A reception in the Sunday School rooms, tendered by the Ladies' Aid and the W.M.S., brought the celebration of the 30th anniversary to a close. A few of the older members were seen to exchange reminiscences over a cup of coffee while sitting down. The younger set moved about through the crowd, found the serving tables with their glittering silver and their dainty refreshments, occasionally heard the notes of the piano and the singing of the violin, met friends, old and new, and then, by and by, went home, quite sure that the Lord, who blessed the wedding feast at Cana in Galilee by His presence, had been here also.



# Pastor's Report

(Abbreviated)

By the grace of God we are permitted to assemble for the 30th annual meeting of our congregation.

My own brief report, dealing chiefly with the ministerial acts of the year 1933, and the equally illuminating reports of the societies of the church, which are to follow, will give you a fair picture of the state of the congregation at the present time.

#### MINISTERIAL ACTS

During the past year your pastor officiated at 43 funerals. Many of the departed were good members of the church, who served their Lord faithfully to the end of their lives. We sincerely mourn their loss and pray that God may comfort the bereaved families.

Among those, whose memory we greatefully cherish as men who were officers of the church are Mr. V. R. Berlet, *†*Feb. 25, 1933, Elder for thirteen years, and

Mr. A. L. Bitzer, †July 16, 1933, Treasurer and member of the Church Council for twenty years. We also hold in loving remembrance Mrs. Christine Berlet, †Nov. 14, 1933, who gave special evidence of her love for the house of God by a gift of one thousand dollars towards the bell in 1922, and who remembered the church most generously in her last will and testament. "I heard a voice from heaven, saying unto me, Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours, and their works do follow them."

During the year under review your pastor baptized 62 infants. It is gratifying to note that the number of infants who are brought to the church for baptism, is larger than in previous years. In holy baptism the child is admitted to membership in the church. For this reason the first rubric concerning baptism, found in the Common Service Book, page 389, directs as follows: "Baptism should be administered at a public service. When circumstances demand, it may be administered privately, but public announcement shall afterwards be made. Parents are urged not to delay the baptism of their children."

On Palm Sunday 60 sons and daughters of our church and 24 adults were received by confirmation, a total of 84. May God grant them grace to be ever faithful to their Lord and to their Lutheran Church.

Twenty-six marriages were performed. This number is far below the average, and is, like the decrease in births and baptisms, directly traceable to the bad times through which we have passed.

The number of members who came to the Lord's Table, however, shows a commendable increase. During Holy Week and on Easter Day 1,424 communicants presented themselves at the altar of our church. The total number was 1,627.

#### CHURCH ATTENDANCE


It is urged upon all members to come regularly to the Lord's Table and to the services of God's house. No one doing so has been deprived of any of the rights and privileges of church membership. Nor has anyone been dropped from the membership list simply on account of inability to contribute to the support of the church. This is our fixed policy, and we want our people to know this, so that all may enjoy the preaching of the Gospel with a good conscience, whether they be rich or poor. At the same time it should be equally clear, that those who neither come to church regularly nor make good their communion with Christ and their fellow believers, forfeit, by their own carelessness and neglect, the right to be counted members of the church.

#### THE CANVASS AND THE CENSUS

On the first Sunday in Advent and during the week following an every member canvass was held for the purpose of enrolling new members, correcting names and addresses already on the list, and to stimulate interest in the work of the church in general. The results were very gratifying. Thanks are due to the 84 men who participated in this visitation as well as to the two women who assisted.

Attention is called to the religious census returns of our city for the year 1933. The Lutheran population of Kitchener is given as 9,314. Five years ago Lutherans numbered 8,726. There is a gain of 612 during the five year period.

Roman Catholics are credited with a population of 8,605, United Church 2,502, Anglican 2,136, Evangelical 2,086, Presbyterian 1,822, Mennonites 1,168, and Baptists 1,383.

#### CHOIR LEADER LAYS DOWN BATON

In December 1933 Mr. Clarence Totzke tendered his resignation as organist and choir leader. While the resignation does not take effect until January 31st, 1934, I should like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to the faithful manner in which he has served the congregation in the important position which he has held during the past five years. While the duties of a church organist may appear to be extraordinarily light to one who does not have to shoulder the responsibilities of that position, Mr. Totzke did feel that he could not do justice to it and at the same time give satisfactory service to the company which employs him. The resignation was entirely voluntary on his part and was accepted with sincere regret by the Church Council.

We have been fortunate in securing for organist the services of Mr. W. H. Bishop, F.R.C.O., A.R.C.M., a man eminently qualified for this position and in entire sympathy with the best standards and traditions of Lutheran church music and worship. Mr. Bishop will take charge on Feb. 1st. We bespeak for him the wholehearted co-operation of the choir and our people in general. It is suggested that those, who love to sing and are gifted with a fair voice, co-operate in a practical way by joining either the senior or junior choir. Both of these organizations extend a hearty welcome to prospective members.

In conclusion, I wish to express to all our people my thanks for their many kindnesses in word and deed, which have helped so much to make my labors during the past year a genuine pleasure. I am especially grateful for the fine spirit of service which prevails among the organizations of the church and rejoice in the progress which they are making and in the splendid leadership which they are developing. This is one of the most hopeful signs for the future. To the members of the Church Council, who have so ably assisted me in directing the affairs of our congregation, I give that acknowledgement which their labours deserve.

May God's blessing continue to rest upon our people during the coming year.

# Report On Church Attendance

#### WM. WEICKER, Attendance Secretary

One of the most hopeful signs of the continued growth of St. Matthews Church is to be found in the marked increase in church attendance during the past year. It is a pleasure for the secretary to report that there was during 1933 an increase in the number of people who came to church of ten per cent over the same period last year. While there is, of course, room for still further improvement, the figures are decidedly encouraging and we have good reason to be proud of our record. Let us hope that the year of our thirtieth anniversary may find our people even more willing to hear and learn the Word of God.

#### INCREASE IN ATTENDANCE DURING 1933

Below there is listed in convenient form the average attendance at services throughout the year. The average attendance for May to December 1932 has been placed in brackets after the figures for 1933.

English A.M. Service 593 (451), German 404 (371). English P.M. Service 394 (294), German 239 (192). English Lenten Service 352 German 270.

In comparing the average attendance for the last eight months of 1932, which is the only period available for comparison, with the last eight months of 1933, we find that the average morning attendance at English services during 1932 was 451. During 1933 it was 496 for the May to December period, an average gain of 45 per Sunday, which is ten per cent.

The attendance at the English services during the first four months of the year was 506, for the last four months it was 507, and for the four summer months it was 477. This difference of only 30 between summer and winter congregations is another healthy sign, indicative of the steadfast loyalty of our people generally. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God."

In concluding these brief observations on the gratifying increase in church attendance, it should be remarked that in calculating the above averages, services of a special nature were not included: the Early Service at Christmas 635, S. S. Christmas Services 907 and 914, S. S. Rally Service 1,083, English Confirmation 1,182, and German Confirmation 650.

# St. Matthews Choir


The choir was organized thirty years ago under the leadership of Mr. Conrad Boettger. Highly gifted as a teacher and as a musician, he labored for 11 years in the best interests, not only of the choir, but also of the other departments of the church's work. Upon his retirement in January 1915, Mr. Boettger was honored with a yearly allowance in recognition of his services, and when on Feb. 19, 1923, he departed this life at the age of 77 years, the choir placed a wreath upon his grave in loving remembrance of their first leader.

His successor was Mr. O. G. Smith, who brought to bear upon the choir a magnetic personality coupled with a good executive ability. For seven years the choir enjoyed his leadership, when he was succeeded by Mr. F. K. Thiele, now organist in Luebeck, Germany. Mr. Thiele assumed his duties on Mar. 1, 1922 and gave conscientious service to the church for two years. Mr. Smith was then prevailed upon to return to the console once more until, after somewhat more than four years of further service, he again laid down his baton because of the pressure of other business.

On March 1, 1929, Mr. Clarence Totzke was appointed to preside at the organ. For a period of five years Mr. Totzke had charge of the music in the church and devoted himself faithfully to his office. The choir expressed sincere regret when he resigned January 31, 1934.

At the present time the choir is in a strong position to give to the congregation musical leadership of the highest type. Mr. W. H. Bishop, F.R.C.O., is not only a distinguished organist, but also a specialist in voice production and an experienced director of chorus choirs. His work as a teacher of music in the public schools fits him particularly for work with junior church choirs.

The president of the choir, or any member of it, will gladly propose for membership the names of any who wish to join their organization. There is room just now for a considerable number of good voices.

Schon dreissig Jahre zurueck liegen die ersten Anfaenge unsers Vereins. Es war am 4. April, 1904, als eine Versammlung berufen wurde zwecks Gruendung eines Frauenvereins. Unter dem Vorsitz des damaligen Organisten und Chorleiters, Herrn C. Boettgers, haben sich 64 Frauen bei dieser Versammlung angeschlossen. Davon gehoeren 16 noch heute dem Verein als Mitglieder an. Es sind dies die Frauen: J. Koch, J. Klachn, W. Kruse, J. Hagen, C. Schultz, A. Sippel, J. Zinkann, Gus. Badke, R. Pinke, L. Timm, C. Damman, Geo. Arndt, J. Schilling, F. Kreiner, Wm. Oswald, und Frau H. A. Hagen.

In den folgenden Monaten und bis zum Ende des Jahres wurden 57 weitere Mitglieder in den Verein aufgennommen, von denen auch noch 12 dem Frauenverein angehoeren, naemlich die Frauen: J. Mansz, V. Wettlaufer, G. Tuchlinsky, L. Wurm, H. Paepke, E. Fries, C. Adloff, J. Rausch, M. Huehnergard, Dan. Kramp, E. Westphal, E. Klem, und Frau R. Kraemer.

Wir freuen uns, dass es diesen 28 Mitgliedern vergoennt gewesen ist, dreissig Jahre lang dem Verein im Segen zu dienen. Moege der Treue Gott sie auch fernerhin noch erhalten und bewahren, und moege das gute Beispiel der Bestaendigkeit, das sie gegeben haben, viele Nachahmer finden.

Schon viele von unsern Mitgliedern ruhen von ihrer Arbeit. Selig sind die, welche im Herrn gestorben sind. Ihre Werke folgen ihnen nach, in der Gemeinde bleiben sie unvergessen, und ihre Namen sind geschrieben im Buche des Lebens.

Heute besteht der Frauenverein aus 175 Mitgliedern, die im vergangenen Jahr wohl fleissiger gearbeitet haben denn je zuvor. Wegen Mangel an Raum in diesem gedruckten Bericht, wollten wir aber lieber die Alten ehren und an die Vergangenheit erinnern, als von den Taten berichten, die noch Allen in frischer Erinnerung sind.

# Our Sunday School Work

#### A BRIEF REVIEW

St. Matthews Sunday School was organized on February 28, 1904. At the end of the first year the enrolment had reached a total of 315 children, and then for a number of years it hovered around the 330 mark and only occasionally came near 350. This was the approximate enrolment in the year 1918.

Then at least three favorable circumstances combined, which in the succeeding years sent the total enrolment of teachers and scholars over the 900 mark, and, with the Cradle Roll, up to 1,200. The three favorable circumstances, which account for this remarkable growth are: first, the growth of the Lutheran population of our city during the years of war prosperity; second, the establishment of an English Sunday School in our church; and third, the good influence of the Cradle Roll, which was organized in 1921.

#### REPORT OF THE CRADLE ROLL

During the past year the Cradle Roll has continued to serve the congregation, as in previous years, under the able leadership of Mrs. A. H. Eaton, Supt.

The work consisted of visiting the homes of the members twice yearly, getting acquainted with the mothers and children, leaving booklets on Christian child training, and sending birthday cards and greetings. The staff, composed

of thirteen teachers and the pastor, also sponsored a picnic on July 21st, a social evening for mothers on October 12th, and a Christmas entertainment on December 21st. All of these were well attended and greatly enjoyed.

At the present time we have 245 infants on our Cradle Roll, which is posted in the vestibule of the church. This number is lower than last year, due partly to the unusually large number, who were enrolled at Eastertime in the Sunday School.

The officers of the Cradle Roll are: Mrs. A. H. Eaton, Supt.; Mrs. A. F. Klugman, Ass't. Supt.; Mrs. Geo. Hoelscher, Sec'y.; Mrs. H. Doerr, Treas.; and Mrs. A. Heldman, Rollkeeper.

On Jan. 26, 1933 we had a balance of \$24.71. Receipts in 1933 were \$50.52, disbursements \$46.52. Balance on hand Jan. 10, 1934, \$28.71.

Our aim has been to serve the congregation and Sunday School in every possible way, and we shall continue to do so in the future.

#### REPORT OF THE GERMAN SUNDAY SCHOOL

Our German Sunday School has at the present time 105 scholars and 16 teachers. During the past year 24 new scholars were added to our school, indicating that a number of parents still wish to have their children receive religious instruction in the language of their fathers. The average attendance during the year was 74 scholars and 13 teachers.

Balance in Mission treasury last year \$34.55. Collections during the year \$64.86. Total \$99.41. Paid for Missions \$75.06, balance in treasury \$24.35. In the Building Fund \$50.00. Birthday Fund \$60.78, receipts \$5.44, expenditures \$2.50, balance on Jan. 1, 1934, \$63.72. Total balance in all of four funds on deposit \$221.21.

#### REPORT OF THE ENGLISH SUNDAY SCHOOL

The growth of the English Sunday School as reflected in the previous reports has been well maintained throughout the year 1933. We take pleasure in presenting a few items of interest concerning the work which is being carried on.

The enrollment as it now stands consists of 689 scholars and 105 teachers and officers, making a grand total of 794. Our Sunday School held 53 sessions with an average attendance of 450 scholars, and 93 teachers and officers. The highest attendance was recorded on October 1, when 593 scholars and 105 teachers were present. Current average collections for the year were \$18.64 per Sunday. The present officers are: Supt., J. H. Eydt; Ass't Supt., G. Hoelscher; Sec'y., W. H. Schafer; Treas., Miss E. Schaus.

The outlook for the year 1934 is very promising. Indications are that a goodly number of new scholars will again be received, and additional teachers are being sought. The officers of the school are indeed gratified with the whole-hearted co-operation which they have received in conducting the work of the Sunday School.

From a survey of our activities we must conclude that our progress has been quite satisfactory, both financially and in the way of attendance at our Sunday School sessions. We believe also that we have succeeded in general to accomplish the purpose of a Sunday School. We are looking forward to continued blessing for our efforts during the year 1934, and bespeak the fullest co-operation from all the members of the congregation in our Sunday School work. We feel that everyone of Sunday School age should attend, and are confident that the parents of the scholars will assist us by sending or bringing their children whenever possible.

Let us all combine our efforts in furthering the work of the Sunday School.

# St. Matthews Luther League

This past year has been one of the most successful in the history of the Luther League.

First of all there is to be noted an increase in the membership, not only on the roll, but also on the list of active members. We now have a total of 69 members representing an increase of 32 over last year's enrollment. Of this total we may consider our active membership to be 30; an increase of eight over last year's total.

During the last year our League has continued its progress towards establishing itself more firmly as a worthwhile service organization of the church, not only socially, but also spiritually. For the first time in the history of the League, a Life Service Programme was held in May of this year.

Our activities were not confined to the limits of this congregation alone. On Labor Day, September 4th of this year, our League played host to the first Workers' Conference of the Luther League of Canada and at which we had as our honored guests, Rev. Paul M. Kinports, Executive Secretary of the Luther League of America, and Miss Brenda L. Melhouse, Junior Secretary of the Luther League of America. From this conference our League has derived much good.

Our League too has taken a leading part in the revival of the joint meetings of the Luther Leagues of Kitchener and Waterloo.

Finally our financial situation is very satisfactory. During the year our League has produced two plays. From the proceeds of these plays we have been able to pay off, not only this year's apportionment to the Luther League of Canada, but also the deficit standing over from the two previous years. The total sum of apportionment payed this year was \$54.10. However, in spite of expenditures of this kind, we are able to show a favorable balance of approximately \$40.00.

# KIRCHE DAHEIM

#### BY THE PASTOR

To the many friends and listeners, into whose hands this booklet may come, Kirche Daheim extends greetings.

On Feb., 23, 1930, Kirche Daheim went on the air for the first time. To-day, as these words are being written, we have completed four years of radio broadcasting, and are about to begin our fifth year of service to the sick and aged.

<sup>®</sup> During the past four years we have received hundreds of letters of appreciation from listeners in all walks of life and all denominations. Countless individuals have sent donations. Many church societies and a host of men and women have become sponsors of designated Sundays of their own selection; some of these are recorded again and again on each succeeding Radio Calendar. Others have given us valuable assistance by volunteering to pay the cost of necessary radio equipment. For all these gifts and deeds of love Kirche Daheim is profoundly grateful.

By "Kirche Daheim" we do not mean the Radio Committee. The members of the Radio Committee are enthusiastic workers for Kirche Daheim, but they are, after all, only the human instruments which attend merely to the needful business and mechanical details in connection with the Sunday broadcasts.

Kirche Daheim is a vast unseen audience composed of old, sick, or invalid folks. Nearly all of them are shutin, either temporarily or permanently. Many are forsaken and lonely. They are burdened by a common poverty — their physical infirmity. And they possess a common treasure — our eleven o'clock church service. These two things unite them firmly together into a brother-





hood which is intangible and invisible, but nevertheless real. John in Tavistock, Helena in Hespeler, and Emelia in Neustadt have come to know each other, and they, with countless others, worship in Kirche Daheim each Sunday.

Kirche Daheim is a messenger of the Lord, bearing the Word of God, the preaching of the Gospel, and the praises of His people. Each Sunday, precisely at 11 o'clock this messenger goes forth on an errand of mercy. Kirche Daheim brings comfort to the sorrowing, joy to the saddened, strength to the weak and despairing. It has shown many a wayward son the way to the Father's house. It has mended broken homes. It goes regularly to hospitals and sanitariums, to prisons and penitentiaries. Where no minister would be admitted, Kirche Daheim has been given glad entrance. Kirche Daheim penetrates everywhere. When snowbound villages were without services, Kirche Daheim, unaware of the deep drifts, was there to give people their Sunday preaching. Kirche Daheim is To-day's Good Samaritan pouring the oil and wine of God's forgiveness into wounded hearts. It is the modern St. Christopher, who on his shoulders bears the dear Saviour across the turbulent river. Its voice is heard in the highway garage, in the boarding house kitchen, and wherever men and women are deprived by stern duty from attending church. Kirche Daheim is the Lord's messenger and everybody's servant.

Kirche Daheim is the doctor's assistant, cheering his patients, and making his work easier. It helps the nurse and the aged attendant who cares for the blind. It supplements the work of the busy pastor and makes for him at least one call to each sick bed weekly. It is a boon to the young mother, who cannot leave her infant baby. It is the church's traveling missionary, who visits isolated families, living miles and miles away from the nearest preaching station. Its offerings in German on every second Sunday are a blessing to the aged and a voice from home to the homesick immigrant in a strange land. Kirche Daheim does all this work single-handed and simultaneously.

# Deals With Correspondence

A letter, dated Ransomville, N. Y., Feb. 19, 1934, is typical of many which we have recently received. It is in German and reads, in translation, as follows:

"Dear Pastor: I must write you a few lines to inform you, that my wife and I listen to your sermon every Sunday over the radio. It makes us feel as though we were again in the homeland, where we first learned the precious truths of God's Word. Your preaching is so impressive that the hour passes only too quickly, and we are always sorry when, with the closing prayer, the service is over."

"Yesterday you announced that a souvenir booklet of Kirche Daheim would be sent to any requesting a copy. Kindly send me one and also please accept the enclosed contribution in support of your work. If God gives us health, we shall come over some time during the summer to visit your church."

To this couple, and to others like them, we herewith give this souvenir booklet and hope that they will enjoy its reading.

From London, Ontario, a listener, who understands only English, wrote, that he listens just as attentively to the German service, because he enjoys so much the music of the organ and the singing of the choir. He adds the suggetion, that a picture of the instrument and the singers would be welcomed by many appreciative listeners.

We agree with him and because a number of circumstances combine to make a good photograph of the choir and organ very difficult to take, we have tried to make up whatever deficiency there may be in this picture, by including a number of others, which we trust will be of interest to our many radio fans.

On February 11th an invalid, who has worshipped with Kirche Daheim since the first service in the year 1930, wrote, saying:

"I enjoyed St. Matthews Church services to-day, as indeed I do every Sunday. It also gave me a thrill to hear the members of the Committee and dear Mrs. Schmieder's voice, and I would ask you, if you can, to please let me have the words of the fine poem composed by Rev. Mosig for to'day's anniversary."


"Yes, your service came in exceptionally clear and well, thanks to the new amplifier. Oh, what spiritual blessing and comfort God's gift, the Radio, brings to me each Sunday. It is placed at my bedside, where I can tune in to your services regularly. I am like the invalid John in Tavistock and never let anything interfere with my hour of worship with St. Matthews Church, which means so much to me. Please accept my thanks for having my request hymn sung last Sunday, and may God continue to bless you all."

# Progress Towards Perfection

The secret of any successful business can invariably be traced to good service. To maintain good service, constant improvement is necessary. The public demands the best. Good service endeavors to meet this demand and strives steadily for progress towards perfection. It can honestly be said that these principles have been applied to our broadcasting activities, and to this the success of Kirche Daheim must largely be attributed.



During the past four years we have never ceased to make additions and improvements to our broadcasting equipment, involving the expenditure of considerable sums of money, but it was always done with a view to better service. To reproduce our church service in the homes of our many listeners as faithfully and as clearly as possible, has been our fixed purpose. It was our conviction that nothing in the way of improved mechanical equipment is too good for our audience. The aged and the infirm, whom we serve, deserve it. The sacred treasure, which we are privleged to transmit, requires it.

When Kirche Daheim went on the air four years ago, we did as well as we knew how. Our equipment consisted of two microphones and a portable amplifier. Many were pleased. Encouraging letters were received. Contributions and support poured in upon us in a surprising volume. But the ears of the Radio Committee were alert to hear, and their eyes watchful, to detect opportunities for improvement. Within a few months, therefore, the first amplifier was scrapped. A new one was built and a third microphone was installed to better pick up the music of the choir. Then a fourth microphone was secured. This was suitably concealed so as to pick up with greater distinctness the altar service. And finally, on our fourth anniversary, we were able to add still another, and at the same time to completely modernize our operating equipment, so that today Kirche Daheim possesses probably the most complete installation enjoyed by any church.

These things, however, could not have been accomplished without the help of our friends. Every microphone was specially donated to Kirche Daheim. St. Matthews Choir supplied one, the Hon. W. D. Euler another, Mr. C. H. Musselman a third, Dr. Gillespie the fourth, and Dr. Hett the most recent one. The cabinet for the amplifier, as well as the stands and brackets for the mics, were likewise contributed by friendly artisans.

Thus it will be seen, that our desire to give good service has invariably met with a corresponding appreciation and co-operation. In the continuance of this policy, with its encouraging results, we hope to make further progress together for the common good of all.
